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Letter from the President:

Hello to Everyone in Greater Idlewild:

This is the first electronic newsletter generated by the Idlewild Community. Five years ago, the board voted to begin electronic-only newsletters to save the costs associated with printing & mailing. The data management committee began diligently acquiring current email addresses of all residents. If any resident observes an error, or desires an edited address, please contact David Chapman, Craig Sutton, or a board officer with the necessary change. The newsletter will be included on the Idlewild website.

A notice was posted by email & social media, but in case you missed it, Idlewild has a new caretaker. Joe Romero began his duties on 10/11/2020. He was highly referred to us by prominent Eagle Nest and Angel Fire citizens. Residents that have met Joe expressed favorable comments regarding his personal interaction & work ethic. Please try to meet Joe upon your arrival to Idlewild. I believe you'll agree he is a significant asset to the community.

As many of you know, IWCC campaigned to dissolve the Extra Territorial Zone (ETZ) proposed by a Joint Power

Agreement (JPA) between Colfax County and Eagle Nest. Deliberate lack of affected public input and a variable zone boundary not drawn by a certified engineer demonstrated inadequate concern regarding the citizenry included within the ETZ. Approval could have possibly allowed Eagle Nest to be involved with IWCC governance and potential annexation of Idlewild. The ETZ was not approved, and the JPA was withdrawn by Colfax County. The community expresses sincere thanks to all who responded against the ETZ (virtually 100% of responses), with special thanks to Donna Woolsey, our neighbors- the Gallagher Ranch, Mutz Ranch, and other noteworthy citizens within the potential zone. We will attempt to discuss and clarify this subject at the annual business meeting.

At time of this letter, spring has arrived on the mountain. Abundant winter snow and intermittent spring storms have provided a good start to foliage and allowed the lake to rise. The scenic drive through the canyon continues to improve.

Residential outdoor activities will soon begin. Please be careful with outdoor fires and try to adhere to the community guidelines posted on the

website. Upon your initial arrival, you may notice some ongoing road improvements. Repairs commenced during the winter, and the contractor is trying to complete projects prior to your appearance. Scheduled action could not occur last year, increasing the road assignments, so please be patient if the work interrupts your property access.

With the continued decline in viral infection, IWCC will attempt to return to normal activity. The community center will be available, and we intended to resume church services. The community meeting will occur on July 25. Please attend, enjoy worship, some great food & fellowship, then share your ideas on maintaining & improving the community.

A great season awaits us, and we hope to see everyone on the mountain. Please come early & stay late!

BEAR WISE:

Six BearWise Basics

- **Never feed or approach bears.** Feeding bears (intentionally or unintentionally) trains them to approach homes and people for more food. Bears will defend themselves if a person gets too close, so don't risk your safety and theirs!
- **Secure food, garbage and recycling.** Food and food odors attract bears so don't reward them with easily available food or garbage.



- **Remove bird feeders when bears are active.** Birdseed and other grains have a high caloric content, making them very attractive to bears. The best way to avoid conflicts with bears is to remove feeders.
- **Never leave pet food outside.** Feed outdoor pets portion sizes that will be completely eaten during each meal and then remove leftover food and food bowl. Securely store these foods so nothing is available to bears.
- **Clean and store grills.** After you use an outdoor grill, clean it thoroughly and make sure that all grease and fat is removed. Store cleaned grills and smokers in a secure area that keeps bears out.
- **Let neighbors know.** Share with your friends and neighbors news about recent bear activity and how to avoid bear conflicts. Bears have adapted to living near people. Are you willing to adapt to living near bears?

The Bear Facts

- Never feed a bear. It is illegal to create a nuisance by feeding bears.
- Unsecured garbage is the primary cause of most human-bear conflicts.
- Bears generally will avoid humans unless they become conditioned to eating human food or garbage.
- In most locales vegetative material comprises 80-90% of black bear diets.
- Black bears occur in all mountainous areas of New Mexico, from Chama in the north to the Guadalupe and Peloncillo Mountains in the south.
- New Mexico is home to a unique subspecies of black bear, the aptly named New Mexico black bear (*Ursus americanus amblyceps*), which also occupies portions of Arizona, Colorado, Utah and Texas. Colors can be black, brown or cinnamon, but all are considered black bears.
- Grizzly bears no longer occur in New Mexico.
- Adult black bears weigh between 125 and 600 pounds. They are strong enough to rip doors off cars.
- Cubs weigh 10 to 16 ounces at birth and are born while the mother is in the den during the winter.
- Black bears can run up to 35 miles per hour, climb trees and swim well.

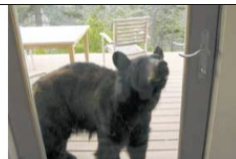


Spring has sprung and has awoken the area with great beauty in the observable flora and fauna. It has also brought forth the local black bears, who have been chiefly dormant during the winter months. Most of their energy stores have been depleted; therefore, they are out and about foraging for food in the Idlewild area. Our local black bears are rarely a safety threat to people unless provoked. Keeping trash or food items indoors or in bear-proof containers is the most effective way to reduce the chances of unwanted close encounters. Please admire the beauty of these amazing animals from a safe distance. Included below are helpful tips from the New Mexico Game and Fish Department.

See a Bear, Back Away

Every once in a while, people have face-to-face encounters with black bears. Do not panic. Chances are the bear is just as wary of you as you are of it. If you do encounter a bear, follow these rules to be safe.

- Do not run! - If you see a bear, stay calm.
- Stand upright - Slowly wave your arms.
- Back away - Slowly back away from the bear.
- Look for cubs - Do not come between a mother and her cubs.
- Fight back - If attacked, fight back aggressively.



Homeowners, Secure Your Property

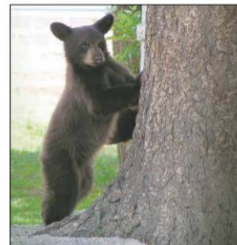
By making the following recommendations a part of your daily life when in bear country, you can keep bears alive and yourself safe.

- **Garbage:** Store it in closed, sturdy cans kept inside a secure garage. Do not put out garbage the night before a scheduled pickup.
- **Pet food:** Feed pets indoors. Store food in secure metal cans inside a sturdy shed or garage. Make sure the garage door is closed at night.
- **Bird feeders:** Set out only enough bird seed to last throughout the day. Hummingbird feeders must be brought inside at night. Hang bird feeders from trees, not on the porch or from the house rafters.
- **Fruit trees:** Plant fruit trees away from your house. Fruit should be picked as it ripens. Spoiled fruit that falls to the ground should be removed, because it will attract bears.
- **Woodpiles:** Keep woodpiles away from the house. It attracts rodents, which bears eat.
- **Compost piles:** Keep piles away from the house. Do not add melon rinds or other fragrant fruits.
- **Beehives and chicken pens:** Livestock and beehives should be kept away from your house. Protect them with electric fencing.
- **Barbecues:** Clean after each use, and store in a closed sturdy shed or garage.

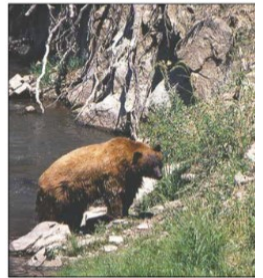
Campers, Use Extra Precautions

A bear's nose can get you into trouble. Follow these tips to keep your camp clean and safe.

- **Keep a clean camp.** Do not leave food items or garbage out when not in use.
- **Coolers are just lunch boxes to bears.** Keep them in hard sided trailers, campers or vehicles with the windows rolled up and doors locked.
- **Fragrant items attract bears.** Toothpaste, insect repellents, soap, candy bars and other fragrant items can attract bears and should be securely stored away from sleeping areas.
- **Cooking odors attract bears.** If possible, cooking areas should be at least 100 yards from sleeping areas.
- **Change your clothes.** After cooking and before going to sleep, change clothes.
- **Hang it up.** Suspend human food, pet food and garbage from a tree at least 10 feet off the ground and four feet from trunks or branches.
- **Strain your dishwasher.** Strain food particles from dishwasher and pack them out with garbage.



- **Pack it out!** Never bury or burn garbage. The next group of campers may encounter bears attracted by trash that you left behind. If available use bear resistant trash receptacles.
- **Leash 'em.** Keep pets on a leash.



Hikers, Watch Your Step

When hiking in bear country, be especially alert.

- **Hike in groups**
- **Make noise.** A surprised bear can become a dangerous bear.
- **Know where they are.** Keep your children and pets close at hand.
- **Don't trash it.** Don't leave trash on the trail. Pack it in, Pack it out!

FireWise 2021 Update:

It has been quite a couple of years. Our great Firewise Chairman, Frank Ray, has retired due to health concerns and Caretakers, Goose and Kim Jarigese have moved to Colorado. I have stepped up, after working under Frank for several years to assume the chair position on the Firewise Committee and Joe Romero has come in as our new Caretaker. We had one serious forest fire on the Taos Pueblo Ranch land, just to the west of Idlewild, which was put down by the Taos Pueblo Fire Department.



In case you didn't know, in 1950 the Taos Pueblo "Snowball" Fire Crew rescued a five-pound American black bear cub who later became known as "Smokey" out of the embers of a huge forest fire near Ruidoso, NM. The Los Tablos and Capitan Gap fires, which burned over 17,000 acres, were stoked by 70-mile per hour winds that made the fires hard to fight. Adolph Samora, a member of the Snowball crew, remembers putting out fire hotspots when some other firefighters called him over to what looked like a crumpled jacket lying on the ground.

"The little cub was covered," he said. "A crewmember picked it up and placed it in my arms. The cub had blisters all over his hands and feet." Crew members wrapped the three-month-old cub in their own jackets to protect his severely burned paws while they transported the little bear to safety.

A local New Mexico family nursed Smokey back to health, and the bear was later moved to the National Zoo in Washington, D.C., where he lived for the next 26 years. We have had a great start on our Firewise reporting with the overwhelming generosity of the Idlewild Community for the repair of our Caretaker's truck. Joe Romero with the 4-wheel drive truck's ability to have "eyes on the mountain" are our first level of defense for forest fires.

Following in Frank Ray's boots is no small task, but Joe Romero and I are working on it. Frank's mapping of our community's 234 cabins and multiple roads have been praised by the Colfax County Fire Chief and shown to other communities as a great example of help for the volunteer fire departments. Our highly visible road signs are another great asset for the fire department and the rescue squads.

With our continuing Firewise outreach, I would like the Board to look at changing for our community needs and adopting, "The Code of the West". This is a great 7-page publication originated by New Mexico State University and has been changed and adopted by the Santa Fe and Taos communities. It is a good informational roadmap on living in rural mountain communities. The part that I first looked at is titled, **You Can't Mess with Mother Nature**, which is very true for Idlewild. It goes on to talk about wildlife, agriculture, ranches and gives a brief history of their areas. I think it would be a good addition to the Firewise outreach that Frank Ray has established for our great community.

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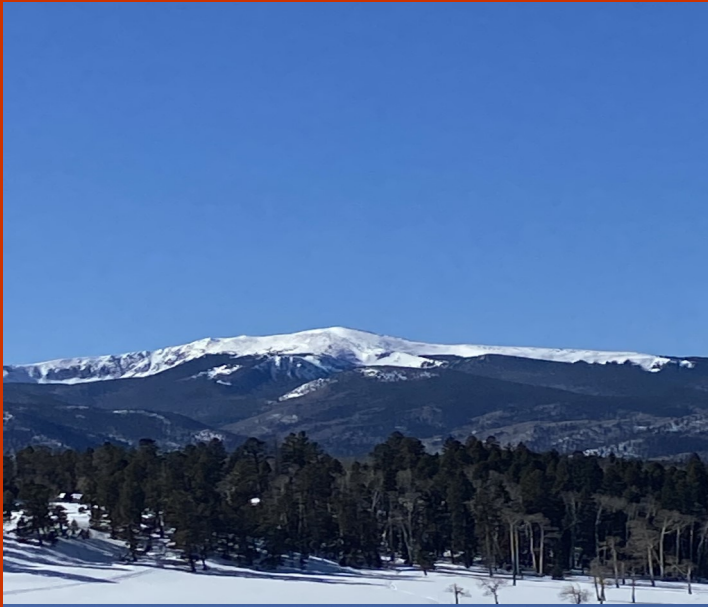
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
